Foresight Day at UN 2.0 Week 2025



UN 2.0 Week 2025 brought together UN colleagues and partners to explore how the Quintet of Change — data, digital, innovation, behavioural science, and strategic foresight — can deliver real impact across the UN system. Strategic foresight took centre stage on Thursday, 12 June with a high-level opening panel moderated by the UN Futures Lab/Global Hub, nine foresight-focused side events led by teams from across the UN, and an interactive solutions expo featuring two real-world use cases. From inclusive, feminist, and equity-driven futures to applied foresight in complex systems, institutional innovation and programmatic shifts, the day featured dynamic initiatives led by 15+ UN entities and partners driving foresight into action across the system.

Delivering Foresight Impact at UN 2.0 Week 2025





"Reclaiming Tomorrow: Rebuilding Young People's Faith in the Future"



The UN Resident Coordinator's Office in Kenya and the UN Futures Lab/Global Hub collaborated with Shujaaz Inc., a network of social ventures based in Nairobi and Dar Es Salaam, on a report titled *Reclaiming Tomorrow: Rebuilding Young People's Faith in the Future*. The report traces how the differing realities faced by the current generation of young Kenyans have shaped their perspectives and attitudes towards the future of Kenya. Drawing from research of more than 2,500 young people across Kenya, the process mapped six groups of young Kenyans, each with different expectations of the future, different priorities, and different needs from the Government. This provided the basis for the Government, UN, and other key stakeholders to form five targeted policy recommendations. Envisioning the Future: Scenario Thinking for AI- Powered Virtual Worlds




As part of the **2nd UN Virtual Worlds Day**, the **World Bank ITS Technology Innovation Office** and the **UN Futures Lab/Global Hub** hosted a participatory foresight session titled: ***Envisioning the Future: Scenario Thinking for AI-Powered Virtual Worlds***. The session explored how Artificial Intelligence (AI) and virtual technologies can drive sustainable development by reimagining work, jobs, skills, and education of the future. Forty participants from diverse backgrounds engaged and produced 8 artefacts, “Terms of Reference for Tomorrow”, which depict future capabilities needed to ensure that AI-powered virtual worlds leave no one behind. Outcomes of this session will contribute to the conference’s Call to Action: ***AI-Powered Virtual Worlds for Social Development***, which was launched as an input to the **Second World Summit for Social Development**.

"2025 Human Development Report"



UNDP's *2025 Human Development Report* explores the implications of AI for human development and the choices we can make to ensure that it enhances human capabilities. Rather than attempting to predict the future, the report argues that we must shape it by making bold decisions that allow for AI to augment what people can do. As human development progress experiences an unprecedented slowdown, the report shows how Artificial Intelligence (AI) could reignite development. It advocates for a human-centered approach to AI, with its potential to fundamentally redesign approaches to development.

"Emerging Breakthroughs on Climate Change Working Paper"

The *Emerging Breakthroughs on Climate Change* working paper is a result of a youth-led horizon scanning exercise led by 12 [UNICEF Leading Minds Fellows on Climate](#). Young leaders from diverse regions and backgrounds identified over 150 signals of potential climate breakthroughs and analyzed how these breakthroughs might impact future generations. Using strategic foresight methodologies, emerging solutions across five domains were analyzed (e.g. eco-literacy, equitable energy transitions, climate finance, loss and damage, and community-centric governance), followed by a mapping of intended and unintended consequences of emerging climate solutions.



Foresight creates space for thinking about new opportunities and possibilities, taking a longer-term perspective, and articulating current needs and priority actions that can be taken to shape the preferred future scenario.

The [Foresight Approaches in Global Public Health](#) course by the World Health Organization (WHO) provides an overview of various methods and tools that can be used to understand emerging trends and changes to explore their potential impacts on global public health. It will feature ways foresight can be applied in global public health, such as emerging technologies, mitigating biorisks, and preparedness for future epidemics and pandemics. The target audience for this course are technical teams and mid- to senior-level professionals responsible for planning, prioritization, and strategy setting.
